Stewardship Reflection

We begin this Holy Week with the reading of the Lord's Passion from the Gospel of Matthew. It is fitting that during this week we intensely focus our minds and hearts on the steps of our Savior as He laid down His very life for us. But let us also examine the seemingly small acts of stewardship by some who encountered Jesus during this most eventful week.

One occurred when Jesus gave instructions about the room where He would celebrate the Passover. Jesus said, "Go into the city to a certain man and tell him..." "In your house I shall celebrate the Passover with my disciples." While we do not know this man's name, we do know he agreed to this request — he shared the material gift of his home and the gift of hospitality. Because of his good stewardship, his own home became the site of the institution of the Eucharist!

There was also Simon the Cyrenian, who offered the gift of his physical strength, helping the Lord to carry His Cross. Consider, too, the actions of Joseph of Arimathea — he generously shared a material gift of the tomb that was his, and he gave the gift of service to our Lord by giving Him a proper burial. Then there were the "two Marys" who gave Jesus the gift of their time. Keeping watch in tender vigil after His death, they "remained sitting there, facing the tomb."

Each of these were simple acts of good stewardship, yet God used them in mighty ways. God invites each of us, too, to cooperate with Him in small ways through the sharing of our time, talent, and material gifts. Small gifts can become mighty deeds when placed in God's service.

Liturgy and Music Corner

Palm Sunday is known as such because the faithful receive palm fronds for the reenactment of Christ's arrival in Jerusalem. In the Gospels, Jesus entered Jerusalem riding a young donkey, and the townspeople threw clothes, or possibly palms or small branches, in front of him as a sign of homage. This was a customary practice. Palm branches are widely recognized as a symbol of peace and victory. The use of a donkey instead of a horse is highly symbolic, representing the humble arrival of someone in peace, as opposed to arriving on a steed in war.

The palms are blessed and many people will fashion them into small crosses or other items of personal devotion. These may be returned to the church, or kept for the year. Because the palms are blessed, they may not be discarded as trash. Instead, they are incinerated to create the ashes that will be used in following year's Ash Wednesday observance.

The colors of the Mass on Palm Sunday are red and white, symbolizing the redemption in blood that Christ paid for the world. The summit of the Liturgical Year is the Easter Triduum—from the evening of Holy Thursday to the evening of Easter Sunday. Though chronologically three days, they are liturgically one day unfolding for us the unity of Christ's Paschal Mystery.

The single celebration of the Triduum marks the end of the Lenten season, and leads to the Mass of the Resurrection of the Lord at the Easter Vigil.

The liturgical services that take place during the Triduum are:

- Mass of the Lord's Supper
- Good Friday of the Lord's Passion
- Mass of the Resurrection of the Lord

What did Jesus do on the cross?

On Good Friday JESUS was taken before King HEROD and the governor, PILATE. Even though He had not committed any crime He was scourged and condemned to die on the CROSS. He CARRIED the cross as far as He could up CALVARY hill, but when He got too weak a man named SIMON of CYRENE was forced to help Him. On the way He met His mother, MARY, who WEPT at seeing her Son in such pain. A woman named VERONICA wiped the blood and sweat from His face with a cloth. At the top of the HILL Jesus was thrown onto the cross and His HANDS and FEET were fastened to it with NAILS. They raised the cross, where Jesus hung for three hours before He DIED. He did all this to SAVE us from Hell. At the cross were JOHN, Mary MAGDALENE, His mother, and some other women. At the moment He died the curtain of the old Temple was TORN in half. When His body was taken down from the cross JOSEPH of Arimathea and NICODEMUS BURIED Him in a new TOMB and rolled a HEAVY STONE in front of the door.



Family Bible Moment

In last Sunday's preparation for this weekend's readings, we walked with Jesus and His triumphant entrance in Jerusalem only to find a few days later people calling for His death—"Crucify Him!"

Looking ahead to next week—Easter Sunday—we see how the story of Jesus does not end in the tomb with His death. Our Creed tells us "...He suffered death and was buried, and rose again on the third day..." Easter Sunday is the third day! And throughout all the Sundays of Easter, we hear of the first appearances of Jesus to His followers and of their responses. Let us imagine Jesus appearing to us as we reflect on the Resurrection over the next 50 Days.

Read next Sunday's Gospel, **John 20:1-9**

- An angel appears to the women at the empty tomb. How do you think they felt? How would you feel to receive news that seems impossible? Would you have believed the Angel?
- What does the Angel say to the women to encourage them? He then sends them to share the good news. With whom?
- We have the good news of the Life, Suffering and Death, and Resurrection of Jesus (the Paschal Mystery). Do we share it?



It's Holy Week—A Time of Final Preparation

Our 40 Day journey with Jesus in the desert during Lent is coming to a close as we begin our last—and most intense—phase of preparation: the Sacred Triduum. The word 'Triduum' means "Three Days", corresponding with the last three days before Easter. Each day of the Triduum has a particular focus:

- **Holy Thursday:** We focus on the Institution of the Holy Eucharist as we commemorate the Last Supper. It is also a night of prayer with Jesus in adoration. Many churches remain open this night until midnight for people to watch and pray with Jesus. Just as in the Gospels we hear how Jesus went to the Garden of Gethsemane after the Last Supper.
- **Good Friday:** We walk with Jesus in His greatest suffering, mistreatment, pain and agony. It is the great Sacrifice on the Cross. We gather in the afternoon to commemorate his passion on the Cross, and reverence the Cross.
- **Holy Saturday:** In the morning, we walk with Mary in her being separated from her Son Jesus. The tone changes in the evening to one of anticipation where we gather to welcome His resurrection. It is on this holy night our Elect will be baptized and our Candidates in RCIA will be brought into full communion in the Catholic Church.

Jesus Loved. On Palm Sunday we begin Holy Week, the final stage of Jesus' mission of mercy to save us by offering his life for us. In the Gospel we read about Jesus entering Jerusalem riding a donkey. People celebrate Jesus as their king, praise him, and thank him by waving palms and crying out "hosannah!" Although the crowds did not know it, Jesus knew that the celebrations would not last. It would end sadly, in His crucifixion and death. But it wasn't the end of the story of the end of the mission. The story ends with Jesus' resurrection and his mission continues through us, His missionaries of mercy.

Let us Pray: Loving God: Our Lenten days are coming to a close. Maybe we didn't do what we had hoped to do, but help us to use this Holy Week to spend more time with you in prayer so that our hearts might become more merciful like yours. Let us use our Lenten sacrifice to help those most in need. Amen

Reflect Together: #WORKSOFMERCY

Discuss some or all of these questions as a family:

- Share a memory when you celebrated something or someone when you were sad. How did you feel while doing it? Who or what helped you get through it?
- Think of those who may be forced to celebrate even though they are feeling sad. E.g. those who don't get selected for a team, those who have lost someone they love. How could you help them get through it?

Take Action as a Family: Works of Mercy

- We are invited to do Works of Mercy during Lent. This week, let us focus on:
- **Visit the Imprisoned.** During His passion, Jesus was imprisoned. As a family, think of someone who is a shut-in in their home or apartment. Visit that person or offer to take them for a meal or cup of coffee. Visit someone in a nursing home, or if visitors are not allowed, write cards offering prayers for them.

A Glimpse of Spirituality 靈修一瞥67 (Matt 瑪3:13-17)

People always keep on asking what kind of baptism of Jesus is and why he was baptized by John his cousin at the Jordan River. Does it imply that he is also a sinner who needs repentance? Is this action self-contradictory while Jesus is the Son of God?

John recognized Jesus as the one whose way he was preparing. His appearance to make preparation is described by Jesus as his coming “in the way of righteousness”: “For John came to you in the way of righteousness; and you did not believe him.” (Matt 21:32)

Jesus’ answer to John is given with messianic authority: “Let it be so now; for thus it is fitting for us to fulfill all righteousness.” The imperative verb “let it be” (aphes) and the adverb “now” (arti) denote the emergency of Jesus’ baptism. But why did Jesus need to be baptized by John?

Noteworthy is that Jesus did not stay in the water to confess his sins but came out immediately. He was baptized as to show his solidarity with his people in their need. The Messiah, thus, identified with his people fully and, obediently acting out his role, received the anointing of the Spirit in order to accomplish his mission. That mission and that identification with his people ultimately involve the death of Jesus on behalf of his people. Therefore, the baptism of Jesus refers to his death and resurrection.

The one who is to baptize with the Spirit must experience the anointing of the Spirit. The affirmation of Jesus as God’s Son partakes of messianic associations through the use of Ps 2:7, “You are my son, today I have begotten you.” Jesus is now anointed with the Spirit. He is declared as the Son of God, the powerful anointed one, and the humble servant who obediently accomplished the will of God.

Jesus underwent the rite as the occasion of the formal beginning of his ministry. All of this is in keeping with the will of God, who will now bring salvation to the world through Jesus not by the exertion of power but through his death and resurrection.

人們總是不停地問耶穌的洗禮是什麼一回事，為什麼要在約旦河接受若翰給罪人悔改的洗禮？是否暗示耶穌是個需要悔改的罪人？既然耶穌是天主子，受洗行動是否自相矛盾？

若翰認出耶穌就是他正在為他預備道路的那一位；耶穌將若翰描述為“履行正義”：“因為若翰來到你們這裡履行了正義，你們仍不相信他。”（瑪21:32）

耶穌給若翰的回答具有默西亞的權威：“你暫且容許吧！因為我們應當這樣，以完成全義。”動詞“容許” (aphes) 和副詞“現在” (arti意指立刻或現在，不是暫且) 指向耶穌受洗的迫切。但為什麼耶穌需要接受若翰洗禮？

值得注意的，是耶穌並沒有在水中悔罪，而是立即從水里上來；他受洗是為了表明他與罪人一起，對罪人，耶穌絲毫沒有任何嫌棄與排斥；因此，天主子默西亞完全認同他的子民而履行他的牧職，接受聖神降臨身上，以完成他的天主使命；這使命讓耶穌為所愛的罪人致死；因此，耶穌受洗指向他的死亡復活。

耶穌是天主子，要用聖神施洗；天父的聲音，印證耶穌是祂的兒子：“你是我的兒子，我今日生了你。”（詠2:7）耶穌就實行天父的救贖工程，一切從謙虛的洗禮開始。

天主現在通過耶穌將救恩帶給世界，不是靠著行使權力，而是通過他的死亡復活。

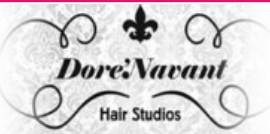
