



A Scripture Reflection from the Cathedral Young Adults:

And in the morning, a great while before day, [Jesus] rose and went out to a lonely place, and there he prayed.

-Mark 1:35

When I read this verse, I hear the silent stillness of a world just beginning to stir from sleep. I see the soft glow of dawn approaching. I feel the gentle morning breeze upon my face. Christ had been miraculously healing His people late into the night; and once this new day began, He would be preaching all over Galilee. Between these ministries, Christ sought out solitude to be still in the presence of God through prayer.

Back in college, I struggled with both prayer and solitude. Despite my involvement in Campus Ministry, my own personal relationship with Christ was hurting. My faith became almost exclusively focused on tangible experiences of community and, as a result, I lost interest in things like personal prayer and Eucharistic Adoration. I felt they lacked any kind of concrete benefit. How could personal prayer be more important than taking action, serving others, or being in community?

I was so wrong, and this misunderstanding of the nature of prayer had major consequences. As involved in my community as I was, I was constantly in a state of profound loneliness. When I limited God to tangible experiences of community, the silence of solitude became deafening. I had

a deep fear of missing out and would go out of my way to avoid being alone with myself. The thought of seeking out "a lonely place" for prayer would have terrified me.

Thankfully, God has loved and worked on me, even when I have struggled to do the same. In this past year with the Cathedral parish, I have rediscovered the deep intimacy of inviting the Lord into the stillness of my heart. I realize now that the Lord does not expect us to get by with our own strength. He wants to be close to us, walk beside us, and work through us in this messy, broken world. I had my hands on the wheel and told Christ I'd ask Him for directions every now and then.

Now I know that He wants me to rest in His arms while He carries me. Even Christ, as we see in this verse, took time away from healing others to be alone in prayer. Do I think I somehow need prayer any less than Christ did?

It's still a journey, but I find myself much more comfortable when moments of solitude present themselves. I try to view these moments as Christ wanting me all to Himself for a bit, and I embrace the time to be still with Him through prayer. I have noticed my service to others has been more fruitful, my relationships have been more vibrant, and I am slowly overcoming the obstacles to loving God, myself, and others as I make time to seek out that "lonely place" with our Lord.

PASTOR'S CORNER

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On this Second Sunday of Advent, we hear from the prophet Isaiah that the message of comfort needs to be brought to God's people. We are not really sure who will actually provide the comfort, but as we see in the Gospel reading, we believe that the messenger is John the Baptist. The problem is that John's message wasn't very comforting because it required the people to change and be better. Through John, we realize that comfort is usually given from one who is greater to one who is lesser; from one who is independent to one who is dependent; from one who has power to one who is powerless. John's message of comfort is about accepting our place in the reality of who God is and who we are, that we are not even worthy to do the menial job of removing God's "shoes." Once we accept this relationship, then God Himself will provide the comfort.

In my life, I often find myself in a position of authority which can often make me feel uncomfortable. Either I am not well prepared and worthy for the position of authority or I am afraid of the power and responsibility that comes

with the position. I am uncomfortable. However, I feel uncomfortable when someone else is in a position of authority around me. Either they are not worthy and prepared, or they seem nervous and incapable of rising to the responsibility of their position. I am uncomfortable. In addition, when too many people assume the position of power and authority I get uncomfortable, and when nobody steps up to take on the position of authority, I get uncomfortable. So, clearly I am in a state of uncomfortableness. I need to hear the message of Isaiah and John the Baptist to take comfort.

Advent is a time when we are able to indulge in a little comfort. We can enjoy some comfort food, or relax with a good book and cup of hot chocolate. We can spend some time dreaming of the perfect Christmas or remember our childhood memories. But if any of these options are to bring true comfort, it requires that we allow God to nurture us like a parent to a child. As John the Baptist confessed, it means that we admit we are not in charge, not the authority, not the power, not the center, not the answer, not the Christ. We cannot appreciate comfort if we seek to remain in charge or fail to admit our dependence on God. Rather, the comfort we indulge in will lead only to guilt and genuine uncomfortableness.

So, this Advent, become more like a child and let God comfort you. He knows you certainly could benefit from a little genuine comfort these days. - Fr. Michael.



As we continue our journey through Advent, we can learn a lot from the Holy Family in the practice of virtue. Last week we looked at the virtue of silence and how it is in silence, that God speaks to our hearts. This week we will consider what happens next; when God speaks, what do we do? Through the practice of LISTENING, we learn to be more like Mary at the Annunciation:

The angel Gabriel was sent by God to a virgin named Mary. He came to her and said she had found favor with God and would conceive a child, the Son of God. Hearing these words, Mary asked how this could be. The angel told her it would come about by the power of the Holy Spirit. Then Mary said, "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word."

With the words "Here I am", Mary said, "yes", to God, putting aside her own plans, and trusting in His Divine Plan for her life. It was in her listening, she found herself able to do God's will. The word "To Listen" comes from the Latin word: 'obedire'. We derive the word **OBEY** from this word. The virtue of OBEDIENCE, is the virtue of "holy listening". Obedience sounds like a difficult thing, especially when a boss tells us to do something we don't like, or when as children we are playing a game and our mom or dad tells us it is time to get washed up for dinner. In these moments, let us take up the example of Mary, who let the Angel Gabriel interrupt her, and listened to what God wanted. Lord Jesus, help us to take up "holy listening" like your mother Mary, and find joy in doing the will of God.

En este segundo domingo de Adviento, escuchamos del profeta Isaías que el mensaje de consuelo debe ser llevado al pueblo de Dios. No estamos realmente seguros de quién proporcionará el consuelo, pero como vemos en la lectura del Evangelio, creemos que el mensajero es Juan el Bautista. El problema es que el mensaje de Juan no fue muy consolador porque requería que la gente cambiara y fuera mejor. A través de Juan, nos damos cuenta de que el consuelo generalmente se da de uno que es mayor a uno que es menor; de uno que es independiente a uno que es dependiente; de quien tiene poder a quien es impotente. El mensaje de consuelo de Juan se trata de aceptar nuestro lugar en la realidad de quién es Dios y quiénes somos nosotros, que ni siquiera somos dignos de hacer el trabajo servil de quitarnos los "zapatos" de Dios. Una vez que aceptamos esta relación, Dios mismo proporcionará el consuelo.

En mi vida, a menudo me encuentro en una posición de autoridad que por lo general puede hacerme sentir incómodo. O no estoy bien preparado y no soy digno para el puesto de autoridad, o tengo miedo del poder y la responsabilidad que conlleva el puesto. Me siento incómodo. Sin embargo, me siento incómodo cuando alguien más está en una posición de autoridad a mi alrededor. O no son dignos y no están preparados, o parecen nerviosos e incapaces de asumir la responsabilidad de su puesto. Me siento incómodo además, cuando demasiadas personas asumen la posición de poder y autoridad, me siento incómodo, y cuando nadie se acerca para asumir la posición de autoridad, me siento incómodo. Entonces, claramente estoy en un estado de incomodidad. Necesito escuchar el mensaje de Isaías y Juan el Bautista para consolarme.

El Adviento es un tiempo en el que podemos disfrutar de un poco de consuelo. Podemos disfrutar de una rica comida o relajarnos con un buen libro y una taza de chocolate calien te. Podemos pasar algún tiempo soñando con la Navidad perfecta o traer recuerdos de nuestra infancia. Pero si alguna de estas opciones es para brindar un verdadero consuelo, es necesario que permitamos que Dios nos cuide como un padre a un hijo. Como confesó Juan el Bautista, significa que aceptemos que no tenemos el control, que no somos ni la autoridad, ni el poder, ni el centro, ni la respuesta, ni Cristo. No podemos apreciar el consuelo si buscamos permanecer a cargo o no admitimos nuestra dependencia de Dios. Más bien, la comodidad con la que nos permitimos conducir solo a la culpa y la incomodidad genuina.

Entonces, este Adviento, conviértase más en un niño y deje que Dios lo consuele. Sabe que sin duda podría beneficiarse un poco del verdadero consuelo en estos días.

A medida que continuamos nuestro viaje a través del Adviento, podemos aprender mucho de la Sagrada Familia en la práctica de la virtud. La semana pasada vimos la virtud del silencio y cómo es en el silencio que Dios habla a nuestros corazones. Esta semana consideraremos lo que sucede a continuación; cuando Dios habla, ¿qué hacemos? A través de la práctica de ESCUCHAR, aprendemos a ser más como María en la Anunciación:

El ángel Gabriel fue enviado por Dios a una virgen llamada María. Se acercó a ella y le dijo que había encontrado el favor de Dios y que concebiría un hijo, el Hijo de Dios. Al escuchar estas palabras, Mary preguntó cómo podía ser esto. El ángel le dijo que sucedería por el poder del Espíritu Santo. Entonces María dijo: "Aquí estoy, la sierva del Señor; hágase en mí según tu palabra".

Con las palabras "Aquí estoy", María dijo "sí" a Dios, dejando a un lado sus propios planes y confiando en Su Plan Divino para su vida. Al escuchar, se encontró capaz de hacer la voluntad de Dios. La palabra "Escuchar" proviene de la palabra latina: "obedecer". Derivamos la palabra OBEDECER de esta palabra. La virtud de la OBEDIENCIA, es la virtud de la "escucha santa". La obediencia parece una cosa difícil, especialmente cuando un jefe nos dice que hagamos algo que no nos gusta, o cuando de niños jugamos un juego y nuestra mamá o papá nos dice que es hora de lavarnos para la cena. En estos momentos, tomemos el ejemplo de María, que dejó que el ángel Gabriel la interrumpiera y escuchó lo que Dios quería. Señor Jesús, ayúdanos a emprender la "escucha santa" como tu madre María, ya encontrar gozo en hacer la voluntad de Dios.



HOLY EUCHARIST


