

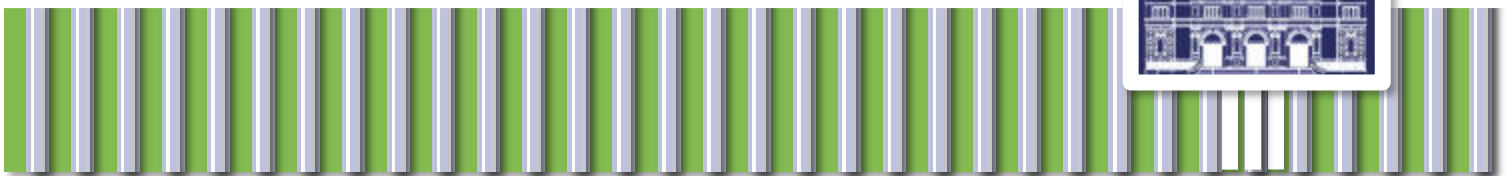

PASTOR'S CORNER

I recently received my letter of renewal as pastor of the Cathedral from Bishop Soto. My second term will conclude at the end of June 2024. That seems like such a short time from now, yet the most I have ever spent in one parish as pastor was only four and one half years in Orland. I am already well beyond seven years here at the Cathedral and still feel like I am just getting into the swing of things. I pray my renewal comes across as good news, but I understand that some certainly have suggestions that would help me improve as a pastor.

As the weeks go by, I do find myself wondering when things will settle down a bit and I can find more time for contemplative prayer. Each weekend is always packed with weddings, a special celebration and the usual eight Masses we offer for Sunday worship. I'm pleased that the Cathedral is a very active parish and pray that it will always make a positive statement of Christ's love to our downtown community. I also pray that our doors remain open with expanded hours to invite all those who pass by an opportunity to come in and pray. Balancing our availability to be a welcoming people with the need to also care for and secure both the faithful and our building is always challenging. Still, Jesus reminds us to fear not and trust in Him.

I do thank all those who participated in our ministry fair and pledge drive in late September. Many new volunteers expressed interest in being more involved and participating in a ministry here. As well, we received 132 pledges of financial support as we begin a new pledge cycle. This is a positive sign, it being our first time encouraging a yearly pledge, and I hope that many of you who did not return a pledge card made a private commitment in supporting the financial needs of our parish. We also recognize the many visitors who attend our Eucharistic celebrations, 32 of whom also filled out cards in support of the continuing efforts of our Cathedral parish.

I look forward to the next five years of ministry here at the Cathedral and know many exciting and challenging opportunity will arise. I pray that every one of those opportunities is a moment filled with grace and is charged with the Spirit to the Glory of God the Father. Amen.

THEN [JESUS] SAID TO HIM, "STAND UP AND GO; YOUR FAITH HAS SAVED YOU."

~LUKE 17:19~

GOSPEL MEDITATION

"Ten lepers met him. They stood at a distance ..." In the ancient world and into the Middle Ages, there was no treatment for leprosy. People thought it was wildly contagious and were suspicious of any skin diseases. Lepers were isolated from civil society. This isolation was upheld by the Mosaic Law. Should there be a healing from leprosy, the former leper was to present himself to a priest to certify the healing. Like Jesus commands, "Show yourselves to the priests." The person would then undergo a religious rite to be formally reintroduced to society. In other words, a leper got their life back. So why didn't they come back?

"As they were going they were cleansed. And one of them, realizing he had been healed, returned, glorifying God in a loud voice; and he fell at the feet of Jesus and thanked him." Of the ten lepers healed by Christ, only one returns with a grateful heart. The others, perhaps, were thankful enough. Perhaps they couldn't believe their luck, and they hastened to the priests to confirm the healing. They were more than willing to leave their life of rejection and isolation behind. Why take any steps backward, when the way ahead was so attractive? An attitude like this is perhaps understandable, but few would admire it.

How about you? Do you come back? If you've ever had the experience of getting what you hoped and prayed for, you know that this can sometimes be easier said than done. When we've wanted something badly enough, how easy it can be to focus on the gift rather than the giver. The truth is, God is daily offering us gifts: the gift of our existence, of the created world, of family and friends, of modern conveniences. Even in times of distress, there is always something to be thankful for. This Sunday, give yourself a gratitude check. Count your blessings. Glorify God and thank Him for the gift of your life!



QUESTION:

How can I practice gratitude in my everyday life?

ANSWER:

God has given each of us many blessings. Fostering an "attitude of gratitude" might be easier than you think. Simple, concrete practices can help us to be more thankful more often. Incorporate it into your dinner with your spouse, or as you tuck the kids into bed at night. "What are three things you're thankful for today?" Make a habit of writing one note a week to someone special in your life, thanking them for how they've impacted you. This is also a good practice in the workplace. Consider opening your weekly meetings with a quick round of gratitude sharing. "I'm grateful John helped me with that last-minute change to my presentation last week. I wouldn't have finished it in time for the meeting without him."

Another way is to designate a few minutes to thank God. This could be the first bit of your daily prayer time or after you receive communion on Sundays. You can also integrate it into your daily routine. How about while brushing your teeth? There's probably nothing so important it can't wait two minutes. Brush your teeth, quiet your mind, and thank God from your heart for His blessings throughout the day. Get creative! Any moment is an opportunity to praise and thank God.

To Give of Oneself

In the South, the use of "Yes, Sir," "Yes, Ma'am," and "Thank you," have been drilled into many a little person's brain. Unfortunately, as time goes by, those social conventions seem to be in danger, even in the very places that have held them sacred for so long. In fact, I have found that I sometimes will even get a strange look when I utter similar words to a stranger or passer-by. It seems manners are being traded for acceptance of ill-conceived tolerance, even tolerance of the ill-mannered.

We know this is nothing new when we look at the story of Jesus' healing of the ten lepers. After healing ten, only one comes back to show gratitude to the healer. Why did 90% of those healed not offer thanks?

We all find our lives filled with blessings. We may sometimes think we deserve the good things we receive. We may also believe because everyone receives the same gifts — things like life, air, and the planet — that God didn't single us out, and our obligation to offer thanks is diminished. However, gratitude is never obligated. The other 9 did not get their leprosy back due to ungrateful hearts. Gratitude is simply the gift we give to the one who was generous to us in the first place. A gift for a gift. Generosity gives birth to more generosity. Without as much gratitude in the world, there is less chance for an increase of love and generosity. So, who do you need to thank today?

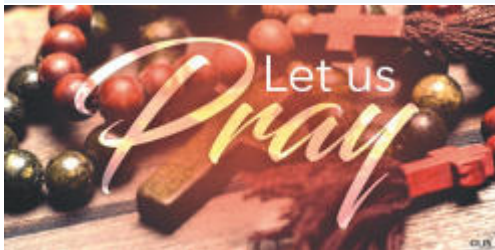

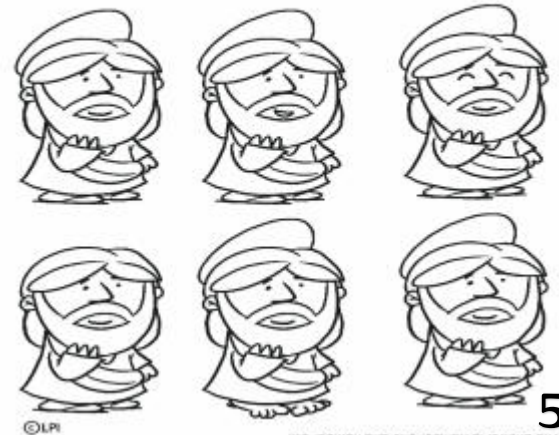

MEDITACIÓN EVANGÉLICO

Este Evangelio nos muestra lo extensivo de las expresiones que se pueden tener en la vida de fe. Alabar, dar gracias, rezar y ofrecer a Dios todo lo que se tiene y lo que se es con un sentido de gratitud por todos los dones recibidos. Aunque muchas veces solo se acude a Dios en la enfermedad o la desgracia, y ahí en esos momento y circunstancias se exigen hasta milagros. En las lecturas de hoy, se nos habla de enfermos de lepra y el cómo fueron sanados. En el Evangelio, los diez leprosos estaban abandonados a su suerte fuera de la ciudad y de la sociedad de su tiempo. De camino tuvieron la suerte de que Jesús pasaba entre Samaría y Galilea yendo hacia Jerusalén. De repente le salen al encuentro los leprosos y le dicen: "Jesús, Maestro, ten compasión de nosotros." (Lucas 17:12-13). Él les envía a los sacerdotes, pero en el camino surge el milagro y quedan limpios de la lepra.

¡Que maravilla! Esto es lo que pienso que se dijeron aquellas personas completamente sanas de su enfermedad. Pero la lectura del Evangelio nos dice que solo uno regresa alabando y dando gracias a Dios. Hasta Jesús se sorprende y le pregunta: "¿No han sido sanados los diez? ¿Dónde están los otros nueve? ¿Así que ninguno volvió a glorificar a Dios fuera de este extranjero?" (Lucas 17:17-18). Dios siempre interviene en nuestro sufrimiento, su compasión no tiene límite. Aquí el mensaje estriba en saber de cual lado se está: de los que regresan a dar gracias, o de los que siguen el camino sin agradecer por los beneficios recibidos. ¿De cuál grupo eres tú?

VIVIR LA LITURGIA

Cuando se esta en un lugar de privilegio, es difícil ver todas las maravillas, curaciones y gracias que Dios nos otorga. Podemos fácilmente dar por hecho la presencia perdurable, sanadora y sustentante de Dios en nuestras vidas si nuestra visión está demasiado enfocada en los placeres, el estatus o las preocupaciones terrenales. Aquellos que tienen menos, a menudo tienen un mayor aprecio por incluso los regalos más pequeños y las más pequeñas bendiciones. Vivimos en un mundo de merecimiento, y esta forma de pensar errónea de que las cosas "se me deben a mí" o son "merecidas por mí" puede distorsionar y corromper nuestra visión. ¿Cuántas veces al día estás verdaderamente agradecido y lleno de gratitud? Si realmente atesoras la vida que Dios te ha dado, entonces cada respiro que tomes puede ser una oportunidad para expresar un aprecio gozoso. Cada momento de la vida es una ocasión para la sanación y la transformación.

LA CORRESPONSABILIDAD DIARIA

Dar de uno mismo

En el sur, el uso de "Sí, Señor", "Sí, Señora" y "Gracias", se ha taladrado en el cerebro de muchos chiquitines. Desafortunadamente, a medida que pasa el tiempo, esas convenciones sociales parecen estar en peligro, incluso en los mismos lugares que las han mantenido sagradas durante tanto tiempo. De hecho, me he dado cuenta de que, a veces, obtengo una mirada extraña cuando pronuncio palabras similares a un transeúnte o a un extraño. Tal parece que se están intercambiando modales por la aceptación de una tolerancia mal concebida, incluso por la tolerancia de los maleducados.

Sabemos que esto no es nada nuevo cuando observamos la historia de la sanación de Jesús de los diez leprosos. Después de sanar a los diez, solo uno regresa para mostrar gratitud al que los sanó. ¿Por qué el 90% de los sanados no ofrecen su agradecimiento?

Todos encontramos nuestras vidas llenas de bendiciones. A veces podemos pensar que merecemos las cosas buenas que recibimos. También podemos creer que, porque todos recibimos los mismos regalos, cosas como la vida, el aire y el planeta, que Dios no nos mostro preferencia y que nuestra obligación de agradecer está disminuida. Sin embargo, la gratitud nunca es obligada. Los otros 9 no recuperaron su lepra debido a los corazones ingratos. La gratitud es simplemente el regalo que le damos a quien fue generoso con nosotros en primer lugar. Un regalo por un regalo. La generosidad engendra más generosidad. Sin tanta gratitud en el mundo, hay menos posibilidades de un aumento del amor y la generosidad. Entonces, ¿a quién necesitas agradecerle el día de hoy?

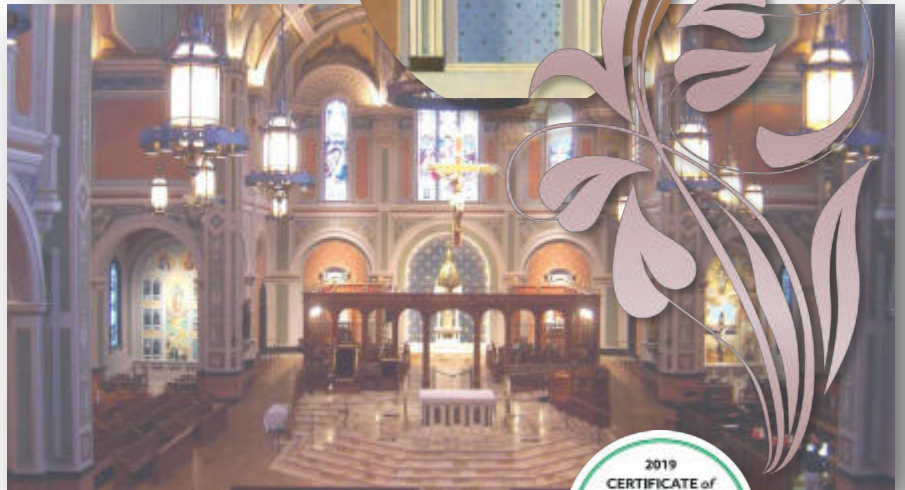
RELIGIOUS EDUCATION PROGRAMS

聖加理多(十月十四日)

聖加理多是羅馬的奴隸，主人托他管理銀行，因業務失敗，存款無法清償，被官廳逮捕，判處苦工勞役。債權人代他求情，暫時恢復自由。他到猶太人會堂索討銀行客戶的償債，以騷擾會堂的罪名，再度被捕，在鐵礦作苦工。過了一個時期，加理多獲得大赦，恢復自由。

教宗聖冉斐利納任加理多為亞比利亞教徒墳場總管理員，至今這墓窟稱為聖加理多墓窟。歷代教宗，自冉斐利納起，至歐弟奇止（除高內略和加理多兩位教宗外）均葬在該墓窟。

聖冉斐利納教宗祝聖加理多為六品副祭。教宗駕崩，加理多榮登伯多祿寶座，治理教務，任勞任怨。主曆二二二年，為主致命。

St. Callistus (October 14)

Saint Callistus is a slave in Rome. The owner asked him to manage the bank. Due to business failure, they could not pay off the debt with the deposits. He was arrested and sentenced to labor. The creditor pleaded for him and temporarily granted his freedom.

He went to the Jewish synagogue to ask the bank's customers for debt repayment. He was arrested again for harassing the syndicate and sent to the mine for hard labor. After a while, he got the amnesty and freedom.

Pope Zephyrinus appointed St. Callistus to be the chief administrator of the Appian cemetery, and today the tomb is called the St. Callistus Tomb. Every Pope starting from Zephyrinus to Eutychian (except for Pope Cornelius and Callistus) are buried in the tomb.

Pope Zephyrinus ordinate St. Callistus as the sixth class alter server. When Pope Zephyrinus passed away, and St. Callistus succeed as the Pope, governing the affairs of the church, and working hard. St. Callistus died in AC 222.
