


Pastor's Corner

We are over half way through the season of Lent and it is a good opportunity to examine how our Lenten practices have been progressing. How have we revealed to ourselves our greater pursuit of prayer, fasting, and works of charity?



In a society like ours, we are quite familiar with the season of Easter. On the surface, Easter is a season of great joy and feasting. In Easter we try to express the great gift of the risen Savior through joyous music, play and gathering. This is something that regularly occurs in our society. Feasting is an everyday occurrence. In a country with such riches, it is easy to reveal the great themes of Easter, even if, internally we do not grasp or even sense all that God is doing.

We, however, are not in the habit of living a Lenten life. Even our fast days are more sumptuous than many of the feast days for our poorer brothers and sisters. The different seasons of the church in our communities tend to blend into the same routine of overindulgence in which we hardly appreciate either the simplicity and sacrifice of Lent or the feast and joy of Easter. We cannot differentiate between the small whispering voice and the loud trumpet call. Our seasons are simply an effort to fill ourselves with something other than the Body of Christ.

There is still ample time to enter into this season of Lent. Make a substantial change in your diet. Do not eat out or buy any drinks from a bar or café. Turn off the electronics. Even if you can't pray, sit quietly in the evening or share some spiritual thoughts with someone. Make a generous donation to someone in need. Experience the "letting go" of material addictions. These kinds of changes lead to true feasting at Easter. I'm sure all of us would understand the joy of Easter feasting if we only ate a bowl of rice and one egg each day during Holy week.



8pm to Midnight. Feel free to come and leave as you want.




Night Fever March 17

An important element of our Nightfever celebration is Adoration. In a darkened cathedral, lit only by candlelight, the mood is reverent and peaceful, perfect for prayer and reflection. Described on catholic-church.org, "Eucharistic Adoration is adoring or honoring the Eucharistic Presence of Christ. In a deeper sense, it involves "the contemplation of the Mystery of Christ truly present before us.

"During Eucharistic Adoration, we 'watch and wait', we remain 'silent' in His Presence and open ourselves to His Graces which flow from the Eucharist ... By worshiping the Eucharistic Jesus, we become what God wants us to be! Like a magnet, The Lord draws us to Himself and gently transforms us. In its fullest essence ... Eucharistic Adoration is 'God and Man reaching out for each other, at the same time!'"

Pictured below is the original monstrance that was used by most of the successive bishops, beginning with the cathedral founder, Bishop Patrick Manogue. For the first time at a Nightfever celebration, this is the monstrance that will adorn the altar. We are fortunate to have such a significant artifact going back to the cathedral's beginning.



As the renovation in 2003 begins, the Blessed Sacrament is removed from the cathedral. This is the first time this monstrance was removed from the cathedral in 114 years.

In the center of the sunburst, the monstrance normally has a small round glass the size of the Host, through which the Blessed Sacrament can be seen. Behind this glass is a round container made of glass and gilded metal, called a luna, which holds the Host securely in place. This monstrance is missing the luna, which is why it hasn't been in regular use at the Cathedral for many years. Using it for Nightfever brings an extra special element to the occasion.

HISTORY

Nightfever was founded by students Katharina Fassler-Maloney, a member of the Emmanuel Community, and Andreas Süß, then a seminarian and today a priest. After World Youth Day 2005 in Cologne the pair thought, "This cannot be the end. This great vibe/spirit of the WYD has to go on in our daily lives...!" Only one event was originally planned, but due to its success it was continued, and then spread across Germany, Europe, and beyond. The first *Nightfever* in North America was held in Halifax, Nova Scotia, in 2012.

On Saturday nights volunteers stand on streets near bars, theaters, and parties in city centers. They approach strangers and say things such as "Hey, want a candle? We're praying for peace." If the passerby agrees they are welcomed into the church, or the volunteer walks them to nearby church where the event is taking place. Participants are welcome to light their candle and leave, or to stay and pray for as short or as long of a time as they like. When they leave, "their candles burn on as a symbol of their concerns and thoughts."

In addition to lighting candles at the altar, common elements inside the church include the Eucharistic exposed for adoration, contemporary Christian music, submitting prayer intentions, and priests on hand to administer the Sacrament of Reconciliation or to provide prayer, support, and counsel. *Nightfever* typically goes late into the night.

An organizer in Britain describes *Nightfever* as "a door opener. For those who once had faith in God we hope they will be renewed through their experience at St Patrick's. For those who have never met Christ we hope this becomes a moment of fruitful encounter." Events often see hundreds and even thousands of people attend. (Wikipedia.org)

WAY OF THE CROSS - Good Friday, March 30th




You are invited, next Holy Saturday, to walk and pray the


Read the Gospel and Color

Ya estamos a más de la mitad del tiempo de Cuaresma y es una buena oportunidad para examinar cómo van progresando nuestras prácticas cuaresmales. Cómo hemos logrado avanzar en nuestro sublime propósito de oración, ayuno y obras de caridad?



En una sociedad como la nuestra, estamos bastante familiarizados con el tiempo de Pascua. Superficialmente, la Pascua es una temporada de júbilo y festejo. En la Pascua tratamos de expresar el gran regalo de la resurrección del nuestro Salvador a través de música alegre, juego y banquetes. Esto es algo que ocurre regularmente en nuestra sociedad. Banquetear es una actividad diaria. En un país con tantas riquezas, es fácil mostrar los grandes temas de la Pascua, aunque, internamente, no nos demos cuenta o nos percatemos de todo lo que Dios hace.

Nosotros, sin embargo, no tenemos el hábito de vivir una vida cuaresmal. Aún en nuestros días atareados nuestras comidas son más suntuosas que los banquetes de muchos de nuestros hermanos y hermanas más pobres. Aunque no puedas orar, siéntate en silencio en la tarde ó comparte algunos pensamientos espirituales con alguien. Haz una donación generosa a alguien en necesidad. Siente el "dejar" la adicción a las cosas materiales. Esta clase de cambios lleva a un verdadero festejo para la Pascua. Estoy seguro que todos entenderíamos la júbilo del banquete pascual si únicamente comieramos arroz y un huevo cada día durante la Semana Santa.

MEDITACIÓN EVANGÉLICO


11 de marzo de 2018 4º Domingo de la Cuaresma
El punto principal en este domingo es descubrir el grande amor de Dios revelado en su único Hijo Jesucristo. Levantado en la cruz para la salvación del mundo. La cruz, es la clave para salir de la oscuridad, es la esperanza de ver la luz a pesar de las penas de la vida. Quizá ha tenido la experiencia de contemplar a Jesús en la cruz, de mirar su rostro, sus manos, su costado y sus pies. ¿Qué sentimientos afloran en su corazón al contemplarlo? ¿Qué cambio radical hace al verlo? Hoy, es el día, de agradecer a Dios por darnos a su Hijo y al Hijo de Dios por aceptar morir por nosotros. ¡Así amó Dios al mundo! Le dio al Hijo Único, para que quien cree en él no se pierda, sino que tenga vida eterna". (Juan 3:1) El Papa Francisco, nos da pautas seguras de cómo ver el amor de Dios por medio de la cruz. "La salvación solo viene de la Cruz, pero de esta Cruz que es Dios hecho carne. No hay salvación en las ideas, no hay salvación en la buena voluntad, en el querer ser buenos. No. La única salvación está en Cristo crucificado, porque solo Él, como la serpiente de bronce ha sido capaz de tomar todo el veneno del pecado que nos ha sanado ahí".

"Pero, ¿qué es la cruz para nosotros? Preguntó el Papa. "Sí, el símbolo de los cristianos, es el símbolo de los cristianos. Y nosotros hacemos la señal de la cruz, pero no siempre la hacemos bien". (Radio Vaticana 4 de abril de 2017). La cruz nos invita a recuperar la identidad cristiana entre nosotros y a levantar la decadencia moral de la sociedad. ¿Cómo llevo yo la cruz?

VIVIR LA LITURGIA - INSPIRACIÓN DE LA SEMANA

Si continúa su jornada de la vida sin un autoconocimiento genuino, sin saber cómo deben estar ordenadas sus relaciones y sin saber qué es la verdad, su camino estará solamente débilmente iluminado. De hecho, cuando tome una decisión equivocada o este confundido sobre su identidad y fácilmente se puede encontrar en una oscuridad. "Porque tanto amó Dios al mundo que dio a su Hijo unigénito, para que todo el que crea en mí no se pierda, sino que tenga vida eterna." Jesús es la luz que llegó dentro de la oscuridad.
