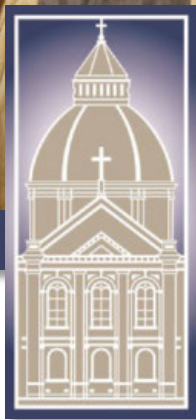

STEWARDSHIP REFLECTION

Today's readings speak of an essential quality for the Christian steward — hope. According to the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, "Hope is the theological virtue by which we desire the kingdom of heaven and eternal life as our happiness, placing our trust in Christ's promises and relying not on our own strength but on the help of the grace of the Holy Spirit (CCC 1817)." In many ways, this is the very definition of a stewardship way of life — focusing on eternity as we live our daily lives and relying on God to provide for our needs and satisfy our deepest longings for meaning and happiness right now.

In today's Gospel from Luke, Jesus describes the true richness of life that is possible for those of us who are willing to live as his hope-filled disciples. We are all familiar with this passage in which Jesus reveals the Beatitudes: blessed are the poor; they have the kingdom of God. Blessed are those now hungry because they will be satisfied. Blessed are those who weep because they will laugh. Blessed are those who are hated, excluded, and insulted because they are disciples of Jesus; they will be greatly rewarded in heaven. Jesus is describing here the character of one who is living a life of hope — the life of a Christian steward whose trust is firmly rooted in God and who is focused on others and eternity. It is not always an easy life, but it is a deeply meaningful life and one that leads to eternal reward.

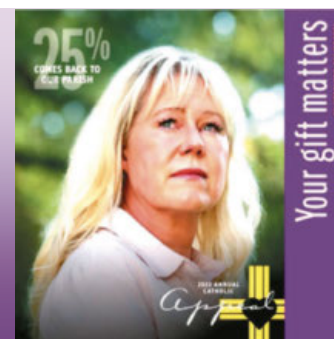

WHAT IS ORDINARY TIME?

And Why Is It Called That? Because the term *ordinary* in English most often means something that's not special or distinctive, many people think that Ordinary Time refers to parts of the calendar of the Catholic Church that are unimportant. Even though the season of Ordinary Time makes up most of the liturgical year in the Catholic Church, the fact that Ordinary Time refers to those periods that fall outside of the major liturgical seasons reinforces this impression. Yet Ordinary Time is far from unimportant or uninteresting.

Why Is Ordinary Time Called Ordinary?

Ordinary Time is called "ordinary" not because it is common but simply because the weeks of Ordinary Time are numbered. The Latin word *ordinalis*, which refers to numbers in a series, stems from the Latin word *ordo*, from which we get the English word *order*. Thus, the numbered weeks of Ordinary Time, in fact, represent the ordered life of the Church—the period in which we live our lives neither in feasting (as in the Christmas and Easter seasons) or in more severe penance (as in Advent and Lent), but in watchfulness and expectation of the Second Coming of Christ.

It's appropriate, therefore, that the Gospel for the Second Sunday of Ordinary Time (which is actually the first Sunday celebrated in Ordinary Time) always features either John the Baptist's acknowledgment of Christ as the Lamb of God or Christ's first miracle—the transformation of water into wine at the wedding at Cana.

Thus for Catholics, Ordinary Time is the part of the year in which Christ, the Lamb of God, walks among us and transforms our lives. There's nothing "ordinary" about that!

Why Is Green the Color of Ordinary Time?

Likewise, the normal liturgical color for Ordinary Time—for those days when there is no special feast—is green. Green vestments and altar cloths have traditionally been associated with the time after Pentecost, the period in which the Church founded by the risen Christ and enlivened by the Holy Spirit began to grow and to spread the Gospel to all nations.



When Is Ordinary Time?

Ordinary Time refers to all of those parts of the Catholic Church's liturgical year that aren't included in the major seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter. Ordinary Time thus encompasses two different periods in the Church's calendar, since the Christmas season immediately follows Advent, and the Easter season immediately follows Lent.

Why Is There No First Sunday in Ordinary Time?

In most years, the Sunday after January 6 is the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. In countries such as the United States, however, where the celebration of Epiphany is transferred to Sunday if that Sunday is January 7 or 8, Epiphany is celebrated instead. As feasts of our Lord, both the Baptism of the Lord and Epiphany displace a Sunday in Ordinary Time. Thus the first Sunday in the period of Ordinary Time is the Sunday that falls after the first week of Ordinary Time, which makes it the Second Sunday of Ordinary Time.

Why Is There No Ordinary Time in the Traditional Calendar?

Ordinary Time is a feature of the current (post-Vatican II) liturgical calendar. In the traditional Catholic calendar used before 1970 and still used in the celebration of the Traditional Latin Mass, as well as in the calendars of the Eastern Catholic Churches, the Sundays of Ordinary Time are referred to as the Sundays After Epiphany and the Sundays After Pentecost.

By the time this gets printed, I will already be in Sacramento having completed my vacation days in Italy. However, as I write this, so much of my visit remains unopened and awaiting the opportunity for me to unwrap it. Today we will go to the Vatican museum, having already been to hear Pope Francis and visit the Basilica of St. Peter, climbing up the dome to see a beautiful view of the city of Rome. Many other impressive sights have been crossed off our list of things to do, but even the simple (not always so simple) getting from one place to another is filled with the beauty of Rome.

The city itself is seeped in religion. No one could miss the reality that the development of this city through the centuries reveals the great belief in the other-worldly and divine. Certainly the ancient Romans left their mark in pointing the people to a belief in something greater than themselves, but at this point in time, very little has escaped being stamped with the great seal of Christianity. The many churches, crosses, images of Mary and Child, religious gift stores and souvenirs attest to the great presences and power of our faith.

In some ways, because there is so much of a good thing, its possible to either approach this man-made beauty as a substitute for the real thing or to simply be so overwhelmed with it all that the story of Christ ceases to matter. However, it's clear that when Rome was being built (not in a day) the message of Christ was sincerely being proclaimed to its citizens and the world. The great truths of our faith revealed in architecture, art, and city planning are constantly implanted on the psyche of its citizens. Today, of course, its possible to simply not give it much thought, to miss the great message of salvation through ignorance and distraction, but anyone who sincerely wants to be embraced by Christ can find His message literally proclaimed from the housetops.

The city, like one great temple, speaks of the Divine, and, as St Paul instructs, an eternal life beyond death. It is a truly holy place that lifts its congregation to the heavens in spite of all the human endeavors needed to maintain it. It has been a blessing and an inspiration to be a small part of this City, both in Rome and in Sacramento.

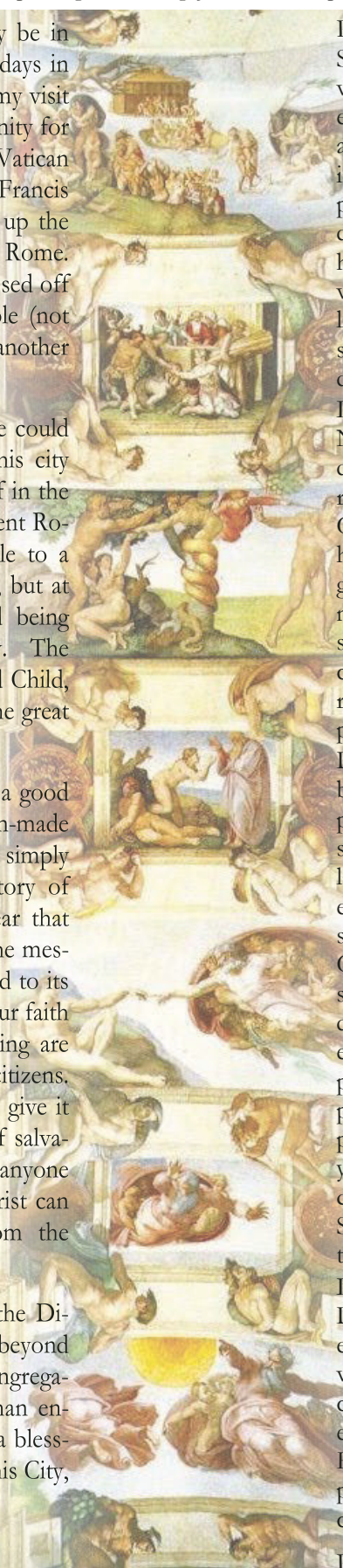
Para cuando esto se imprima, ya estaré en Sacramento habiendo completado mis días de vacaciones en Italia. Sin embargo, mientras escribo esto, gran parte de mi visita permanece sin abrir y esperando la oportunidad de abrirla. Hoy iremos al museo del Vaticano, habiendo estado ya para escuchar al Papa Francisco y visitar la Basílica de San Pedro, subiendo a la cúpula para ver una hermosa vista de la ciudad de Roma. Muchas otras vistas impresionantes se han tachado de nuestra lista de cosas que hacer, pero incluso el simple (no siempre tan simple) ir de un lugar a otro está lleno de la belleza de Roma.

La ciudad misma está impregnada de religión. Nadie podría pasar por alto la realidad de que el desarrollo de esta ciudad a través de los siglos revela la gran creencia en lo sobrenatural y divino. Ciertamente, los antiguos romanos dejaron su huella al indicarle a la gente que creían en algo más grande que ellos mismos, pero en este momento, muy poco ha escapado a ser sellado con el gran sello del cristianismo. Las numerosas iglesias, cruces, imágenes de María y el Niño, tiendas de regalos religiosos y recuerdos atestiguan la gran presencia y el poder de nuestra fe.

De alguna manera, debido a que hay tanto de algo bueno, es posible acercarse a esta belleza hecha por el hombre como un sustituto de la cosa real o simplemente estar tan abrumado con todo eso que la historia de Cristo deja de importar. Sin embargo, está claro que cuando Roma estaba siendo construida (no en un día) el mensaje de Cristo estaba siendo proclamado con sinceridad a sus ciudadanos y al mundo. Las grandes verdades de nuestra fe reveladas en la arquitectura, el arte y el urbanismo se implantan constantemente en la psique de sus ciudadanos. Hoy, por supuesto, es posible simplemente no pensar mucho en ello, perder el gran mensaje de salvación por ignorancia y distracción, pero cualquiera que sinceramente quiera ser abrazado por Cristo puede encontrar Su mensaje literalmente proclamado desde los techos de las casas.

La ciudad, como un gran templo, habla de lo Divino y, como instruye San Pablo, de una vida eterna más allá de la muerte. Es un lugar verdaderamente sagrado que eleva a su congregación a los cielos a pesar de todos los esfuerzos humanos necesarios para mantenerlo. Ha sido una bendición y una inspiración ser una pequeña parte de esta Ciudad, tanto en Roma como en Sacramento.

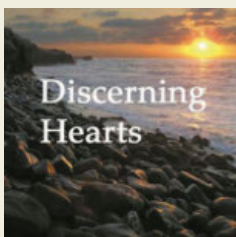
Formation in prayer opportunities:

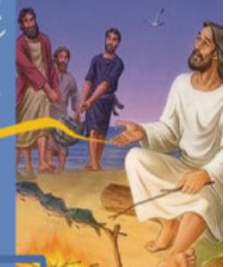

A Glimpse of Spirituality (靈修一瞥) 10

Evangelization? Let us see Anna's example.

As a widow, Anna's complaints and self-pity had been sublimated by her longing for God's salvation. It is a sort of divine cultivation. What she longed to see was exactly the great prophetic task that God asked her to preach the birth of the Messiah. In addition to preaching, Anna is also a good example of the depth of her faith and her testimony to the Lord.

“She did not depart from the temple, worshiping with fasting and prayer night and day.”

The Greek verb of “worshiping” (*latreuosa*) originally means service or worship, and it points to God here. Because Anna was not a priest, she certainly could not serve the community any worships or sacrifices. Her ministry was “fasting and prayer.” Since she was called by God as a prophetess, her ministry was God's spokesperson responsible of conveying God's messages to people.

The verb “spoke” (*elalei*) here means that she talked to others as an expression of her mind. In other words, she used words to declare her mind and disclose her thoughts. Anna did not just talk to everyone whom she met, but those who expressed their desire for redemption.

Anna did not hang around with people. She only reported the good news of Jesus' birth to those who were looking for (*prosdechomenois*) the coming of the Messiah. Regardless of her age, after Anna had received any good news from God, she immediately spread it to those who were willing to accept it.

Life is full of troubles and difficulties. Only the good news of Jesus can release the knots of suffering and death.

福傳，看亞納

一個寡婦，將一般怨婦的抱怨與自憐，昇華，變成恭敬天主渴望救恩的心神是神修

她渴望見到的，天主讓她完成最偉大的先知任務，就是傳揚基督喜訊。

除了宣講，亞納以身作則，就是她的信仰深度，就是為主作證的根據。

“她齋戒祈禱，晝夜事奉天主，總不離開聖殿。”

“事奉” (*latreuosa*) 本意是服務或朝拜，在這裡指向天主，雖然希臘版沒有“天主”一詞，只是“晝夜事奉”，可是已經暗示天主。因為亞納不是司祭，肯定她不能舉行禮儀；她的事奉，就是“齋戒祈禱”，既然是先知，事奉的範圍，就是天主的代言人，傳達天主的話。

現在，她被委派作偉大先知任務，就是“向一切希望耶路撒冷得救贖的人，講論這孩子”。

“講論” (*elalei*) 本意是說話或談論，這裡解作用言語來表白心意，亞納不是碰到誰都說說就算，而是表白她渴望救恩的心意，對像是“一切希望耶路撒冷得救贖的人”。

“救贖” (*lytrōsin*) 意指在舊約中，從監禁中救出，或從奴役中贖回，或從國家不幸中解脫，直說就是解放或釋放。

亞納不是到處串門子，她只向那些等待 (*prosdechomenois*) 默西亞的人傳報耶穌誕生這個喜訊，誰要天主，就立刻得到天主。

亞納不管自己年紀老邁，得到天主喜訊，就立刻傳揚給願意接納的人，福傳，部分性別年齡身份。

人生不如意事，十常八九，只要耶穌降生喜訊，就可以釋放一切痛苦死亡糾纏

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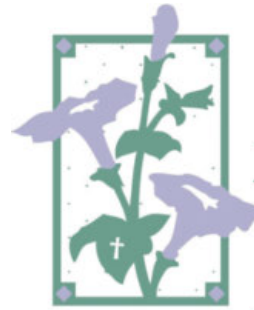


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
